# Week ending January 31, 2025

The U.S. economy continues to show solid growth with Q4 2024 real GDP growing at an annualized rate of 2.3%, just below expectations of 2.5%. US GDP growth was driven primarily by consumer spending, which increased 4.2% annually (its highest level since Q1 2023). The Federal Reserve held interest rates steady, maintaining a patient approach amid solid economic growth, a healthy labor market, and stubborn inflation trends. Earnings season kicked off with strong results from companies like Apple, Microsoft, and Meta, although Tesla missed estimates. Technology stocks, particularly Nvidia and other chip manufacturers, experienced volatility following Monday's news from Chinese AI startup DeepSeek that it developed an AI program comparable to OpenAI's ChatGPT using a fraction of the development costs and computational resources. Much of the sector rebounded later in the week, as the news from DeepSeek was spun as a positive for increasing development and adoption of AI-related technologies. Overall, the S&P 500 is on track for strong earnings growth, with expectations for continued momentum into 2025.

#### **Fixed Income Markets Overview**

- The Federal Reserve held its target policy rate range steady at 4.25%-4.5%, maintaining a patient approach amid solid economic growth and a healthy labor market.
- U.S. Treasury yields fell across the yield curve as rates come off their early January peaks. The 10-year yield is down about 20 bps from its recent high, which helped support bond and equity prices.
- Expectations around potential rate cuts in the short-term continue to ease. The probability of a March rate cut dropped to 16% from 27% the prior week. Expectations for one to two 25-basis-point cuts over the remainder of the year remain intact.
- Since breaking above 6% in September 2022, mortgage rates have fluttered between 6% to 8%, ending last week just below 7%. Higher rates and insufficient supply have contributed to home affordability have challenges causing many potential buyers to remain on the sidelines.



## **Equity Markets Overview**

- It was a mixed week US equities as markets reacted to the DeepSeek news and Federal Reserve's guidance on monetary policy. The Dow Jones continues to lead the way and was the only major US index to post a gain for the week, rising 0.3%. The tech heavy Nasdaq brought up the rear after falling 1.63%, while the S&P 500 came in second after slipping 0.99%.
- Similarly, it was a mixed week from a sector perspective as 6 of the 11 posted losses. Technology, Energy, and Utilities were the biggest losers posting losses of 4.55%, 3.79%, and 2.05%, respectively. Telecommunications, Consumer Staples, and Healthcare led the charge posting gains of 2.67%, 1.92%, and 1.74%, respectively.
- From a size perspective, small cap stocks held up slightly better than
  their mid- and large cap peers, but all three segments posted losses
  for the week, while mid-caps continue to lead the pack on a YTD
  basis. As for style, value outperformed growth last week in the large
  and mid-cap segments, while the inverse was true in small cap. On
  a YTD basis, value is slightly outpacing growth in the large and midcap segments, while growth is handily outpacing value in small cap.

- Oil prices fell for the second straight week. However, this
  recent trend could be short lived depending on the impact
  of any tariffs levied by the Trump administration on oil and
  gas imports.
- Gold prices rose for the fifth consecutive week, briefly breaking above the \$2.8k price level and setting a new alltime high on Friday. Investors seem to be seeking safety leading up to Trump's tariffs, which are causing concerns about global economic growth and inflation.

- As 4th quarter earnings season continues, it will be another busy week of releases. Some key companies reporting this week include Alphabet, Walt Disney, and Amazon.
- As for economic data, this week will bring several releases related to the Manufacturing and Services sectors as well as labor market data. We will be monitoring the S&P Manufacturing Purchasing Managers Index, ISM Manufacturing and Services, weekly initial jobless claims, Nonfarm Payrolls, and the Unemployment Rate releases.

# **Glossary and Disclosures**

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S&P 1500 Index combines three leading indices, the S&P 500, the S&P Midcap 400, and the S&P Smallcap 600, to cover approximately 90% of U.S. equity market capitalization.

S&P 500 Index includes approximately 500 leading companies that covers approximately 80% of available U.S. equity market capitalization.

S&P 500 Growth Index is a stock index that represents the fastest-growing companies in the S&P 500 based on three factors: sales growth, ratio of earnings change to price, and

S&P 500 Value Index is a stock index that represents the companies in the S&P 500 with the most attractive valuations based on three factors; book value, earnings, and sales to price.

S&P Midcap 400 Index is distinct from the large-cap S&P 500 and designed to measure the performance of 400 U.S. mid-sized companies, which have differing liquidity and growth potential than large and small cap companies.

S&P Midcap 400 Growth Index is a stock index that represents the fastest-growing companies in the S&P Midcap 400 based on three factors: sales growth, ratio of earnings change to price, and momentum.

S&P Midcap 400 Value Index is a stock index that represents the companies in the S&P Midcap 400 with the most attractive valuations based on three factors: book value, earnings, and sales to price.

S&P Smallcap 600 Index measures the performance of 600 small-sized U.S. companies to reflect the small-cap segment of the U.S. equity market, which is typically known for less liquidity than large cap stocks.

S&P Smallcap 600 Growth Index is a stock index that represents the fastest-growing companies in the S&P Smallcap 600 based on three factors: sales growth, ratio of earnings change to price, and momentum.

S&P Smallcap 600 Value Index is a stock index that represents the companies in the S&P Smallcap 600 with the most attractive valuations based on three factors: book value, earnings, and sales to price

MSCI ACWI ex-US Index captures large and mid-cap representation across 22 of 23 Developed Markets (DM) countries (excluding the US) and 24 Emerging Markets (EM) countries
